

Primary energy use

How this affects your energy bills

An average household would need to spend £3,059 per year on heating, hot water and lighting in this property. These costs usually make up the majority of your energy bills.

You could save £2,161 per year if you complete the suggested steps for improving this property's energy rating.

5. Biomass stove with boiler	£7,000 - £13,000	£780
6. Solar water heating	£4,000 - £6,000	£104
7. Solar photovoltaic panels	£5,000 - £8,000	£323
